# Cricket Far North Code of Conduct

### The Cricket Far North Code of Conduct is applicable to:

- All competitions organised or sanctioned by Cricket Far North (CFN)
- Any spectator, player, or official involved with Cricket Far North, including participation in competitions, tours, or training camps. The policy is in effect from the time individuals leave their usual residence for an event until they return.
  - The term "official" encompasses team managers, coaching, medical, fitness staff, team selectors and anyone else acting in an official role for Cricket Far North.

#### Who may report a violation of the Code of Behaviour:

- Any individual who has witnessed an incident they feel has breached our code of conduct, including, but not limited to:
  - Umpires
  - o Opposition players, teams, supporters, and/or club officials
  - o Members of the public
- Reports can be sent via clubs in general, however any statements of 'wording heard or actions seen' must have the person who reported it name provided with the report for verification if required.

### How to lodge a report:

- A report must be submitted via the 'forms' page on the CFN website (www.cricketfarnorth.com.au) using the 'lodge a report' link.
- No report will be accepted by any other format including written or email.
- The form allowed for attachment in the form, if you wish to provide letters, photos, screenshots, videos or emails as support.
  - We strongly discourage (however will still accept) handwritten reports in the event of hard to read handwriting.
  - o If you wish to provide frogbox evidence, please provide a link rather then attach video due to the size of the video.

#### Who assesses the report:

- All reports are lodged and assessed by the Match Review Committee who will verify that the charge corresponds to the correct breach and determine the severity of the charge.
- All 'disputes' are also assessed by the Match Review Committee.
- All 'appeals' are run as a hearing by one of CFN Commissioner/s.
- The match review committee holds the right for more serious breaches to send any report direct to a hearing to be chaired by the commissioner/s and skip the initial reporting stage.

#### Conflict of interest:

- No member that has a direct conflict of interest to the report is permitted to be involved in the initial charge, dispute process or appeal process.
- A member can be removed during the process if it is decided or comes to light that they are a

'conflict of interest' to this particular matter by a member of the CFN executive or CFN board.

- Example of direct conflict are, but not limited to:
  - o From the same club
  - Family/close friends
  - Anything else a member of the CFN executive or CFN board decide is a direct conflict of interest in the matter at hand.

### Opposition/Umpire Dealing with Situation During Match.

- The umpire is authorised to take any of the following actions if they suspect a breach of the Code of Conduct. Umpires are encouraged to report the incident at the completion of the game:
  - o Issue a first and final warning which shall apply to all members of the team for the remainder of the match.
  - Award 5 penalty runs. The umpire may apply this penalty multiple times during the match as deemed appropriate.
  - Report player/s (As per 'timeline for lodging a report' below)
  - Direct the captain to remove the offending player immediately from the field of play for a period of 10 overs as part of a 'cool-down' period.
    - If there are less than 10 overs remaining for the innings, then the suspension continues into the start of the next innings (change of innings) until the 10 overs are served.
      - This would apply for any dismissed batter, or if a batter was dismissed whilst an incident occurred, however if there are more than 10 overs remaining in the innings, then the player may resume from the start of the next innings (change of innings) even though they were out.
        - If a team is 'all-out' less than 10 overs since the incident, the player must remain off field until 10 overs across both innings are served, at which point the player may then return to the game.
      - If there are less than 10 overs left in the match, then the player will not be permitted to return for the remainder of the match.
    - If the offending player is part of the fielding team, a substitute will not be allowed for him/her.
    - The offending player may return to the field of play after serving the period of suspension and may bowl immediately.
    - If a bowler is suspended mid-over, then that over must be completed by a different bowler, who shall not have bowled the previous over nor shall he/she bowl the next over.
    - If the offending player is suspended while batting, he/she shall be replaced by another member of his/her team.
    - If the offending player is a member of the batting side, who has not been dismissed, he/she may bat or return to bat after having served the suspension, only at the fall of a wicket.
    - If no batter is available to bat during a batsman's suspension, the innings is completed.
    - If the offending player was suspended while batting and does not continue his/her

- innings for whatever reason, he/she is to be recorded as Retired not out.
- The umpire has the right to upgrade this to a full match suspension if the player continues to breach the code of conduct after leaving the field.
- This suspension wouldn't be considered as part of punishment if a report is lodged and whilst being assessed by CFN, and purely is an action from the umpire during the match to prevent escalation.
- o Direct the captain to remove the offending player immediately from the field of play for the remainder of the match.
  - This suspension wouldn't be considered as part of punishment if a report is lodged and whilst being assessed by CFN, and purely is an action from the umpire during the match to prevent escalation
- In games with no official umpires, teams cannot award 5-run penalties for these incidents, however captains can come together and discuss together a serious situation and come to a collaborative decision of either a 10 over or a full game suspension.
  - o It is encouraged a report is lodged if this was to occur.
  - If both captains can't come to a collaborative decision and one captain feels the game should not continue due to safety concerns, then they have a right to end the match and send to CFN to make a ruling on the result.
    - CFN will have the right to rule a win to either team or leave it continue as a draw depending on the match situation, the conversation between the captains and the seriousness of the offending player behavior.
- Captain refusing to remove a player from the field/Player refusing to leave the field
  - If a captain refuses to carry out an instruction to remove a player from the field, or if the player refuses to leave the field as directed by the captain, the umpires shall invoke Law 16.2 of the CFN playing regulation and award the match to the opposition team.

#### **Serious Breaches of Code of Conduct:**

- A serious breach may cause delays in the reporting and assessment process. If a resolution isn't reached quickly after a serious breach, the following groups:
  - o CFN Management Committee
  - o CFN Board
  - CFN Match Review Committee
  - CFN Umpires Association Management Committee Member

can request a CFN commissioner to review the available information and consider imposing an immediate automatic suspension on the person being charged.

• This action can be taken when there is clear evidence of the breach, or it's highly likely that the breach will result in a minimum suspension long enough to justify the immediate application of an automatic suspension being applied under this rule.

### **Suspended Sentences**

- If a final verdict is not reached before the next weekend's matches, or if an appeal is lodged, the following measures will be enacted:
  - A provisional suspended suspension will be automatically imposed on the alleged offender.

- This suspended sanction will remain in effect until a decision on the allegation is reached and the Committee has notified their club of the outcome.
- If the alleged offender is reported for another violation of the Code of Conduct before a resolution is reached on their initial breach, the suspension will be activated and no longer suspended.
- o The player will remain suspended until all outstanding reported breaches are resolved.
- Once the Committee reaches a decision, the suspended sanction will be lifted, and the decision will be conclusive.
- Any matches missed due to suspension will be deducted from the total length of the final suspension imposed.

### Timelines for Lodging a Report:

- When an umpire plans to report an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct from a match they have officiated, it is advisable (although not compulsory) to inform the team captain or a club official that a report will be lodged as soon as practicable, ideally within 24 hours of the match's conclusion or the occurrence of the breach.
- All reports should be lodged promptly, ideally within 72 hours after the match ends, however submission is possible up to 30 days following the match.
  - If no report is received within 30 days of the breach, it will be considered void unless for extreme circumstances where the commissioner can give approval for a report to be considered even though outside of the 30 days of breach period.
- A report may be requested to be re-written, or can have additional commentary or evidence
  provided along with it, provided that no changes are made without the consent, approval and
  signature of the person who originally lodged the report by any member of the following:
  - CFN Management Committee
  - o CFN Board
  - o CFN Match Review Committee
  - o CFN Umpires Associating Management Committee Member
- Assistance can be provided to the person who's lodging the report, and modifications can be
  made after submission, provided the final version used for assessing charges is entirely accurate
  from the submitter's perspective. The individual submitting must tick the box at the bottom of
  the form, sign it themselves to verify it's true and accurate, and cannot have someone else sign
  on their behalf.
- A report and/or charge can be changed at any time if a report comes in after the initial lodgement as long as the new information is received within the timelines above.

#### Once a report is received and accepted:

- CFN executive (Executive elected and administration team) as soon as possible, ideally within 48 hours, but no later than 7 days from when the report was received will notify the reported player or person via their club or association and inform them that the report has been received.
- The report, along with any evidence, will be passed to the Match Review Committee by the CFN executive as soon as possible, ideally within 48 hours, but no later than 7 days from when the report was received.
- The Match Review committee will deliberate, either in writing or verbally, and provide their

findings to CFN executive as swiftly as possible, ideally within 48 hours, but no later than 7 days from when they received the report.

- The Match review committee will ensure the charge is under the correct breach and decide on the level of charge.
- The committee may request an extension from the CFN executive, which will be automatically approved if required to gather more information, particularly if the committee believes the available information is insufficient to make a charge.
  - o The CFN executive will notify the reported player or person via their club or association and inform them of the delay ideally within 48 hours, but no later than 7 days.
  - The CFN executive will act to source the additional information as soon as possible,
     ideally within 48 hours, but have up to 7 days to obtain the requested information.
- The CFN Match Review Committee will reach a final decision as soon as possible, ideally within 48 hours, but up to 7 days from when they receive any additional information.
- The Match review committee will present their findings by a majority rules vote. In the case of a tie, the committee must deliberate more until a majority is found.
- A member of the CFN match review committee must be nominated to send findings to the CFN executive and this can be via the 'forms' page on the CFN website (<a href="www.cricketfarnorth.com.au">www.cricketfarnorth.com.au</a>) under sub-committee forms using the 'Charge Findings Form' link.
- CFN executive must past on the findings as soon as possible, ideally within 48 hours, but up to 7 days from when they receive the final findings from the match review committee.

### Storage of Reports and Findings/Charges

- All reports and final outcomes (even if no charge is made) will be stored:
  - o In the CFN Code of Conduct report document (Brief overview of all incident and charges)
  - In CFN's secure online storage.
- Full access granted to the CFN executive.
- All reports will be held for at least 5 years.

#### Response upon receiving the findings from the Match Review Committee:

- The club and/or the reported individual will determine their course of action concerning the incident. They must initially respond using the 'Charge Response Form 1' on the CFN website (www.cricketfarnorth.com.au) within 48 hours of receiving the report to indicate their chosen course of action. An additional 48 hours is provided to complete the detailed response if this is the route taken. Available actions include:
  - a. Accept the charge, where charges will apply, as outlined in the Code of Conduct breach chart.
  - b. Dispute the entire report and plead 'not guilty'. A 'failed dispute penalty' will be imposed if the dispute is unsuccessful.
  - c. Acknowledge fault but dispute the grading and/or level of the charge and asking for a downgrade. A 'failed dispute penalty' will be imposed if the dispute is unsuccessful.
- If the club chooses action (b) or (c), they must submit their detailed response using the 'Charge Response Form 2' within 48 hours after completing 'Charge Response Form 1'.
- Any person who wishes to provide supporting evidence can do so by completing the 'Charge Response - Form 2' within 48 hours of the person being charged completing 'Charge Response -

- Form 1' under the 'forms' page on the CFN website.
- Accepting the charge (a) will finalise the matter, and the charge will be effective immediately unless the Match Review Committee specifies otherwise in the charge report.

#### **Failed Dispute Penalty:**

- When a charge isn't accepted and challenged either in its entirety or for a downgrade, if unsuccessful, the following penalties will apply.
  - o If the initial charge penalty was demerit point/s, then an additional demerit point will be added.
  - If the initial charge penalty was suspension point/s, then an additional suspension point will be added.
  - o If multiple charges are issues, the penalty applies to each charge that is disputed and unsuccessful.
- Contesting the report could result in a higher penalty if the individual is subsequently found guilty of a more serious offence than originally charged.
  - This can occur if additional information emerges, indicating that the initial charge was too lenient, either during the dispute or on appeal.

#### Dispute the report:

- The dispute will be forwarded to the Match Committee along with the statement of dispute for evaluation.
- The Match Committee may decide to pose additional questions in writing, or through an interview conducted in person, online, or via telephone to:
  - o Captain, players or representatives from the club that the alleged offender is at.
  - The alleged offender(s),
  - o Captain, players or representatives from the club of the opposition.
  - o the umpire.
  - or any other individual they consider appropriate. The Committee will reach a decision based on a majority vote and then submit their findings to the CFN Executive Committee. The Executive will:
- The Match review committee will then rule the dispute either unsuccessful or modify the initial charge under the same guidelines and timelines outlines in the 'Once a report is received and accepted'.

#### Appeal of decision

- Any individual dissatisfied with the penalties outlined in the Charge Report may challenge the decision by notifying the Administration Officer within 48 hours of receiving the Charge Report.
  - An appeal can't be lodged until the full process of dispute is followed first, and can only appeal if they don't agree with the dispute outcome.
  - Any appeal lodged after the 48-hour appeal notice period will be considered null and void unless under special circumstances at which the commissioner/s may or may not allow.
- If the match review committee referred on an incident directly to a hearing, an appeal can be made and would be held by:
  - o Another commissioner, who was not involved in the original hearing.

- o If no commissioner is available, a hearing by 3 members of the match review committee.
  - If three members can't be found, then CFN executive is able to request club executives to fill these roles until 3 members are found.
- The CFN executive committee will appoint at least one CFN Commissioner to participate in the hearing.
  - Where more then one commissioner is appointed, the CFN executive will appoint one of the commissioners to chair the appeal hearing
  - Any number of commissioners, from just one to three, may be appointed to attend the hearing.
- The chair commissioner will notify the complainant of the hearing date, which should be set within five days of the appeal notification.
- If all Commissioners are unavailable to handle a charge, the executive may appoint a temporary substitute. These substitutes can be selected from any management committee member of any club, provided they have no connection to the alleged transgressors or club, or from other appropriate sources.
- If both the CFN executive and the alleged offender agree, the hearing may be scheduled after five
  days to accommodate the availability of a commissioner, but it should be held as soon as
  possible.
- Upon receipt of the Appeal Notice, the complainant's club will be charged an Appeals fee of \$300.
  - If the Appeals fee is not paid within 48 hours of the invoice being issued, the Appeal Notice may be null and void.
  - o If an appeal is successful, the club will receive the \$300 retuned by invoice from CFN.
- Final outcomes will be made by:
  - o If only one commissioner, then that commissioner alone.
  - o If more than one commission, they will come to a decision collectively after deliberation.
- The hearing will be closed to the public. Attendees allowed are:
  - o Commissioner/s appointed
  - Alleged perpetrator
  - Alleged perpetrator representative
    - The alleged transgressor is automatically entitled to representation by an Executive member of their Club or Association, provided that person is not a Solicitor, Barrister, or paralegal, unless otherwise specified.
    - Representation by a Solicitor, Barrister, or paralegal may be allowed if deemed appropriate by the Commissioner in consultation with the Match Review Committee.
      - Such a request must be submitted in writing no later than 12 hours before the hearing.
  - Member from the perpetrator club (None speaking role)
  - o Up to 2 members of the CFN executive or match review committee (None Speaking role)
  - o Person/s lodging report
  - Anyone else invited by the commissioner including but not limited to witnesses including umpires, team members or opposition members.
- Ideally the hearing will be face-to-face, but may be conducted virtually (e.g., via Microsoft

Teams) if necessary.

- The commissioner/s will have received and reviewed all reports and evidence before the hearing.
- Non-Attendance:
  - o If an alleged transgressor or complainant is summoned but:
    - fails to appear in person, or
    - fails to send a representative
    - then, the commissioner may assume a guilty plea and impose the maximum penalty, or,
      - The commissioner may consider any extreme circumstances post-event for non-representation and may reschedule a hearing.

#### **Hearing Process:**

- The commissioner may run the hearing process as they wish, however, the person being charged and/or representative must be allowed to comment on there version of the events and why they are appealing the charge.
- The person appealing charge is also allowed limited cross-examination at the discretion of the Commissioner. Any cross-examination will be strictly regulated by the Commissioner and may be ceased for the remainder of the hearing at any time by the commissioner.
- Once the commissioner/s determine that they have gathered sufficient information:
  - o If there is only one commissioner, they must request everyone to leave the room for privacy while they deliberate and make a decision. No one is to remain in the room.
  - o If there are multiple commissioners, they must request that everyone, except the commissioners, leave the room so they can deliberate and reach a final decision.
- A decision will be reached at that time, and once the commissioners have made their final determination, all members will be summoned back into the room to hear the outcome. Results from appeal hearing will take effect immediately.
- The chair commissioner will issue a findings report within 48 hours after the hearing concludes that is the be completed via the website under 'forms' using the 'Charge Findings Form' that will be passed onto the club and person appealing.

#### Finals:

- If incidents occur during finals or prior to finals, CFN have the right to reduce timelines for responses to 24 hours to have an outcome prior to the final.
- CFN has the right to lodge to the commission for an immediate suspension if they believe a serious breach has occurred before finals as per the 'Serious Breaches of Code of Conduct'.

#### **Representative Cricket:**

- The match review committee, commissioner/s or CFN executive have the right to apply and suspension to representative cricket if the suspended period occurs during representative match dates.
- A single match suspension would be equivalent to an entire tournament/weekend even if more the one match is played.
- This would be up to the discretion of the match review committee, commissioner/s or CFN executive if these penalties are to apply for representative matches or not and the severity of

- breach should come into consideration when these penalties are being considered.
- If incidents occur during a representative match or prior to representative match/es, CFN have the right to reduce timelines for responses to 24 hours to have an outcome prior to the representative match/es.
- CFN has the right to lodge to the commission for an immediate suspension if they believe a serious breach has occurred before finals as per the 'Serious Breaches of code of conduct'.

### **Final Findings:**

All decisions made after an appeal are final and no further appeals will be considered.

#### **Demerit Point/Suspension Point Accumulation:**

- Demerit Points will remain on a Player or Player Support Personnel's disciplinary record for a period of 3 years (36-months) from their imposition, following which they shall be immediately expunged.
- Where a Player or Player Support Personnel accumulates four (4) Demerit Points in a 3 year (36-month period), these Demerit Points shall be converted into one (1) Suspension Point.
  - As an example, should a Player accumulate five (5) Demerit Points, four (4) Demerit Points will be converted into one (1) Suspension Point and served at which they are then cleared, whilst the remaining one (1) Demerit Point will remain on the Players record for a period of 3 years (36 months).
- When separate incidents occur and additional demerit points are added to existing demerit points, the initial demerit points are always applied first and continue to be applied in the chronological order of the charges. This means if any demerit points are applied and remain (such as the 5 demerit combined which has 1 demerit remain in the example above), then the remaining points are from the most recent charge, and the 3-year record will start from that incident.

# **Code of Conduct Breach Chart**

The following guidelines relate to all levels of offences. They add extra detail to the Law 42 – Player Conduct levels of offence, explaining how these can impact upon player conduct.

These guidelines are a reference for the CFN Executive Committee, the Commissioner, the Clubs and the match review Committees when deciding suitable penalties for any player, official or spectator who breaches any level of these offences.

Note:	Without limitation, Players and Player Support Personnel will breach Appendix 1.7 if they publicly criticise the Match Officials or denigrate a Player or team against which they have played in relation to incidents which occurred in a Match. When assessing the seriousness of the breach, without limitation, the context within which the comments have been made and the gravity of the offending comments must be considered.  For the avoidance of doubt, any posting by a Player or Player Support Personnel of comments on a social media platform (including, without limitation, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, YouTube, TikTok and LinkedIn) shall be deemed to be 'public' for the purposes of this offence.
